From The Ministry Team

September 1st officially signals the start of Autumn. On the 24th September Wartling Church's Harvest Service takes place, on the following Sunday (1st October) it will be Herstmonceux Church's turn; to give thanks for the gathering of the harvest and to all who contribute to make this possible.

I know some people do not read, watch or listen to News programmes because their content is so depressing. It is true that with all the increase in communication we know so much more about the world, let alone our own country. Sadly it seems that the people who produce all these forms of communication seem to assume that we want to know about bad news.

It is very rare for good news to make headlines over a period. In my recollection the last really uplifting story was when 'Captain Tom' raised money for our N.H.S. At the age of 99 he walked 100 lengths of his garden. In the 24 days this took, he became a household name in our country. He received 1.5 million individual donations and 150,000 cards of encouragement and congratulations.

On the morning of his 100th birthday he had raised £30 million pounds, by the end of that day, when the appeal closed, the amount had increased to £32.79 millions and the final total including gift aid reclaims amounted to £39 million.

I think we are very fortunate to live in the United Kingdom, because there are multiple countries in our world where there are crises of different kinds.

For example the extremely high temperatures coupled with strong winds have caused devastating fires. Countries including Italy especially in Sicily, Spain, Portugal, Canada and the United States, as I write this letter, fires in Hawaii have already caused 53 deaths, with more feared.

These fires are devastating, outcomes include homes burnt down, businesses destroyed and people have lost their livelihoods, and tourists have lost their holidays.

In our world we have also seen how inter-related countries are. The invasion by Russia has not only caused devastation in Ukraine, but has caused high oil and gas prices in many countries, and Ukraine's wheat harvest has been unable to be exported because of a Russian blockade, which will exacerbate the famine in Africa.

As individuals we can pray for an end to the Russian invasion, and that countries supporting Ukraine in their resistance will continue to do so.

We can also pray for the millions of refugees forced out of their countries by war or persecution, and for women and girls in Afghanistan denied their human rights by the Taliban.

As we give thanks for the gathering of our harvest, we must be ever mindful of the needs of so many people in our world.

Famous Hymns

<u>For the Beauty of the Earth</u>, Folliot Sandford Pierpoint (1835-1917) with thanks to celebratingholidays.com and Wikipedia.

Folliot Pierpoint came from Bath. He graduated from Queen's College, Cambridge in 1857 and became a professor of classics at Somerset College. Afterwards, he spent time in Devonshire, and he willingly taught whenever he was given the opportunity. He also published several volumes of poetry and a number of hymns. This hymn was first published in *Lyra Eucharistica* in 1864 – a book of hymns specifically suitable for singing at Holy Communion.

Apparently, in 1863 Pierpoint was wandering through the countryside around the winding River Avon. As he looked on the peaceful beauty surrounding him, he was inspired to reflect on God's gifts to his people in creation and in the church. Above all, he thought of Christ's great sacrifice of his life in return for ours. He originally wrote eight verses as a hymn for the Lord's Supper. The original chorus was "Christ, our God, to thee we raise this our sacrifice of praise." The hymn was meant not only as a song of thanksgiving, but as the only thing we could give Christ in return for his mercy and love: a hymn of praise laid upon the altar as a sacrifice. Editors have since altered the refrain in various ways in our churches' current hymnbook Hymns Old and New, 'Christ our God' is replaced by 'Lord of All', apparently because some liberal theologians struggling with such close identification of Christ and God! Some verses (e.g. one about the Virgin Mary, and another about Christian martyrs) have since been omitted -five verses remain in our hymnbook. It seems Pierpoint's original intention was for the hymn to take on a deeper meaning as something we not only sing, but offer up to God. Indeed, the original chorus for the last verse (now omitted) was "Offer we at Thine own shrine / Thyself, sweet Sacrament Divine."

There are several tunes commonly associated with these words. One by Conrad Kocher, (born in Wurttemburg, 1786-1872), was published in 1838 and will be familiar to you as the usual tune for "As with Gladness, Men of Old" – this tune became known as Dix, as a tribute to William Dix, the man who wrote that carol. The one I know best is called England's Lane, first printed in the Public School Hymn Book (1919), where it was set to Pierpoint's text and originally named Goodfellow. This tune was adapted from an unspecified English melody by Geoffrey Shaw (1879–1943) - Shaw was an enthusiast for folk music (and of Henry Purcell), one of whose aims was to restore the dignity of Christian music. The tune was renamed England's Lane in Songs of Praise (1925). Shaw (a teacher, schools inspector, church organist and composer) was part of a very musical family, but he may possibly be more widely known now as the father of Sebastian Shaw, a Shakespearean actor who had the role in Star Wars of Anakin Skywalker.

Weather in July and early August - Dismal Summer Weather

The unsettled and windy weather which had prevailed for the first half of July continued in rather more acute form for the rest of the month. Hot weather was confined to southern Europe with the Mediterranean experiencing intense heat for a time in mid-July accompanied by the inevitable wildfires in places like Rhodes and Corfu. Winds here blew more or less exclusively from between south and west and were often quite strong taking the edge off the temperatures. The temperature actually declined during the second half of the month when, ordinarily, it would have been moving towards its summer peak. There were no settled spells just isolated days when the weather was less bad. The worst of the weather seemed to be reserved for weekends, a trend which continued into August such that there were five successive weekends when the weather was blighted either by rain or by strong winds and, quite often, by both. On the 25th Herstmonceux was the wettest place in the UK with an inch of rain which, I understand, fell in a very short space of time. Here in Cowbeech we had only a quarter of that amount.

The average maximum temperature for Herstmonceux was just over 20°C almost 4°C below the comparable figure for 2022 and also below what we enjoyed in 2020 and 2021. Furthermore, it was well over 1°C below the 30 year average from 1991 to 2020. The average minimum was just a little lower than recent years but slightly above that 30 year average. The warmest day was the 7th when the temperature hit 29.6°C and the coldest the 27th (just 17.4°C). The warmest night was the 8th (18.6°C) and the coldest the 26th (8.9°C). July was wet with 3.63 inches of rain an inch of which fell on the night of the 27th/28th. Barometric pressure was, not surprisingly, much lower than normal.

UK wide, the hottest place in July was Chertsey on the 7th (30.2°C); the coldest day occurred on Fair Isle, between the Orkneys and Shetland, on the 19th (11.0°C). The coldest night was at Loch Glascarnoch in northern Scotland on the 26th (just 1.2°C). The sun shone for longest at Lerwick in the Shetlands on the 8th (16.1 hrs) whilst the wettest place was Preston Moor Park on Sunday the 23rd when a staggering 98.8mm (almost 4 inches) of rain fell. No wonder then that the final day of the fourth Ashes test at Old Trafford was washed out and the final day of the Open Golf Championship at Hoylake on the Wirral took place in the rain.

Moving swiftly on to the first half of August, there was no real change. An unusually deep depression for early August visited us on the 2nd named Storm Patricia by the French Meteorological Service. We perhaps escaped its worst effects but it was cool and windy with rain at times. There were showers around on the 3rd and 4th but we escaped them only for Storm Antoni, the first storm of the new season named by the Met Office, to arrive for the weekend of the 5th/6th. The 5th proved to be a wet and unpleasant day. Another similar day's weather occurred on the 8th since when it has been mostly dry, often breezy without a great deal of sunshine and mostly rather cool.

Looking ahead, there is no sign of great warmth but it may be slightly more settled and a little less cool. Meteorological summer ends at the conclusion of August and after such early promise it will be a surprise if summer this year does not prove to be one of the least memorable in recent years.

Victoria's Green Page

Plastic is everywhere and has become such a part of our lives we tend to not even think about the waste it causes. From shampoo bottles to drinks, straws and food containers, UK households throw away an estimated 100 billion pieces of plastic packaging a year, averaging 66 items per household per week. These are mainly food packaging items, such as snack bags and fruit and veg trays. In 2021, 2.5 million metric tons of plastic packaging waste were generated in the UK.

We have become dependent on plastics in recent decades due to their relatively cheap production costs, durability, and incredible versatility. Annual global plastics production is now roughly 370 million metric tons per year – an increase of 80 percent since the turn of the century. However, huge amounts of this become waste, with many plastic products thrown out after just one use. These often end up polluting rivers and oceans, causing devastating damage to marine life.

There is a call to action across the globe to change our lifestyles. Plastic Free July encourages people to not use plastic for a month- by making small changes like buying reusable. https://www.plasticfreejuly.org/

Thankfully, consumer demand has prompted some supermarkets to start making some positive steps – Morrison's now feature plastic-free fruit and veg aisles across 60 of its stores.

Some to new schools, some to new classes and with new teachers, what an exciting time. Hopefully you have had a good holiday and ready to start learning new things.


I want to tell you about someone in the bible who started a new life when he met Jesus. His name was Saul but when he met Jesus it changed to Paul.

Learning to Say Thank You

Harvest Festival is a big thank you time: a time of year when for years, those who relied on local farming were thankful for the food that the earth provided, and to God for taking care of them.

Today, for most of us, food comes already picked and packed from a supermarket or the delivery van, not our own fields – so perhaps it's even more important now to remember that our food comes from God's creation, and to thank God and everyone who harvests and prepares it for us.

A way to pray for farmers

Lots of fruit and veg at the supermarket now has the name of the farmer printed on the container. You can put a sheet of paper up in your home, with "Thank you, God, for our food" at the top, and then your child can cut and stick the names of all the farmers onto the rest of the sheet every time you go shopping. When you eat, you can say, "thank you, God, and (all the names) for our food!" (And then finish by thanking those who cooked and will clean up the meal.)

Thank You For ...

Thanking God and those who make our food can help us remember to be grateful for the other good things in life. Maybe at bedtime you and your child can take turns thinking of things to be grateful to God for – from the profound to the very silly!

Or maybe you can finish each day by thinking about all the people you met that day and thanking God for how they help you: the bin man who clears up your rubbish, the lady at the shop who helps you find what you need, the toddler group leaders who sing and cut up bananas, the man on the bus who helped with your pushchair, the doctors looking after Granddad.

There's a lot to be thankful for every day.

Something to make you smile

Many churches are now serving coffee after the sermon. Presumably this is to get people thoroughly awake before they drive home.

"For Christmas," a woman remarked to a friend, "I was visited by a jolly, bearded fellow with a big bag over his shoulder. It was my son coming home from college with his laundry."

Climate Change Can Be Beaten

The issues of climate change are now unavoidable. There have been heatwaves, forest fires and extreme rainfall causing flooding and landslides, but there have been times in the past when the world came together to fix an environmental issue. It was in the 1980s that the trees in Scandinavia were stripped bare of leaves and in North America lakes became devoid of any life. The issues also affected Europe, and the culprit turned out to be clouds of sulphur dioxide from coal-burning power plants. These clouds travelled long distances and after mixing with the rain clouds fell back to earth as acid rain. Much like climate change, there were many warnings about this threat, but just like climate change, there was denial, deliberate misinformation and government standoffs, but eventually, the science could not be ignored. The only way to fight acid rain was by curbing the release of the pollutants that cause it, and this meant cutting down the number of coal-burning power plants, burning fewer fossil fuels and setting air quality standards. This realisation led to international agreements that achieved just that, and so curbed the problem of acid rain.

Next, in the mid-1980s, scientists from the British Antarctic survey pointed out that there was a large and expanding hole in the ozone layer above the Antarctic. The ozone layer prevents harmful wavelengths of ultraviolet (UVB) light from passing through the Earth's atmosphere. These wavelengths cause skin cancer, sunburn, permanent blindness, and cataracts, all of which were projected to increase dramatically as a result of thinning ozone. The Ozone Layer damage was caused by chlorofluorocarbons, a gas better known as CFCs, which were then used in aerosols and refrigerants. The projections showing that the destruction of the ozone layer would adversely impact the health of humans and ecosystems, sparked public fear, mobilised scientific investigation and galvanised the world's governments to collaborate in an unprecedented way, and ozone-depleting chemicals were phased out.

The next environmental success was the phasing out of leaded petrol. Lead additives in petrol released lead particles through the exhaust systems and into the air, these caused health problems including heart attacks and mental development issues for children. Most countries banned lead petrol from the 1980s onwards, and this is estimated that this will prevent more than one million premature deaths each year from heart disease, strokes, and cancer, and will protect children whose IQs are damaged by exposure to lead.

The climate change issue is far more complicated to resolve than the issues above, but that can be no reason for not doing something, because industry and governments have worked together in the past and have solved a globally threatening environmental problem. They need to do the same again.

19:30 15th September: An Evening at the Opera

It's just possible that some of you will be old enough to remember when the Flower Duet from the opera Lakme by Leo Delibes was the theme tune for British Airways – and that's just one example of the many ways in which the drama and excitement of opera has entered popular culture. This programme of arias and duets includes a colourful cast of characters who will take us from the perfumed riverbanks of British India to the American naval presence in early twentieth-century Japan.

Along the way, we'll have time to spare a passing glance at the changing social status of female opera singers, from a time when they were considered little better than courtesans to the rise of the diva in the 19th century and the phenomenon of the trouser role and its relationship to the gradual decline of the castrato tradition. Opera inspired the great piano composers too, so you'll have the chance to hear one of Liszt's virtuoso takes on the operatic masters.

19:30 16th September: The Virtuoso Flute

Music Box Wealden could hardly have a better torchbearer than local flautist Daisy Noton. Currently studying at the Royal Academy of Music in London she has already had competition success at local, national and international levels, not least as a Woodwind Finalist in the BBC Young Musician of the Year Competition in 2020. At the same time, she has maintained a high profile in her native East Sussex and, in her outreach work, has shown herself to be a passionate advocate for classical music in the community.

Daisy is joined by pianist Andra Băcilă in a programme which includes the Undine Sonata by the nineteenth-century Danish/German composer Carl Reinecke, one of the few great Romantic works for the instrument. The Carmen Fantasy by François Borne is a virtuoso showpiece based on themes from Bizet's Carmen – and Dvořák's Song to the Moon continues the operatic theme. Also included is Martinů's Flute Sonata, written in the United States in 1945 after his escape from occupied France.






